



Do you ever have those days when you wake up in the morning and you are already tired? It feels as if the burdens you are carrying are so heavy that even rising from the bed seems too difficult. Many things make us weary: the tasks to accomplish, the relationships to nurture, the schedules to manage, the information overload to endure, and the relentless barrage of news to absorb. I had a morning like this just the other day, and in the midst of the thoughts swirling around my head, I thought of Galatians 6: 9-10:

9 Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. **10** Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers.

We can invest our time, our material resources and our physical endurance in so many ways and places. However, we all have limits; we grow weary. We are incapable of doing it all, and perhaps we should not even try to "do it all". So then, how do we live? I would propose that we follow Paul's exhortation and allow ourselves to grow weary of certain things but not to grow weary in doing

good to others.

Paul reminds us that doing good will reap a harvest in time. We may not see the results of the investment we make in doing good, but we trust that God will use our generosity and grace to others somehow. And Paul is specific to say that all people are worthy of receiving the good we do; no one is left out.

As I think about the very full and busy ministry lives of Denver Seminary alumni, I want to give you freedom to grow weary – grow weary of too many tasks, of too much information, of moving too fast and of climbing too many ladders. But, do not grow weary of doing good. It is the good we do in the lives of other people that is the richest and most powerful witness of the transforming nature of the Gospel.




Amanda Grace Caldwell, MA CMHC 2014


Doug Groothuis
