
2022-2023 PRESIDENT'S REPORT









A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

The opportunities and the challenges before us require that ministry leaders are able to interpret Scripture responsibly and think theologically as they help the Church create a credible and compelling witness to the gospel of lesus Christ.

Opportunities. In many parts of the world churches are growing and multiplying rapidly. These churches and denominations need theologically grounded pastors who teach the truth of Scripture and confront false teaching. We live in an era when technology allows us to educate these leaders wherever they live. We are proactively stepping into the opportunity to greatly expand the reach of Denver Seminary throughout the world.

Students from around the world can now enroll in Denver Seminary's programs, which prepare them to become missionaries, lay leaders, pastors, counselors, and educators around the globe.

Currently we have students studying in 15 different countries including Canada, China, Ethiopia, Japan, Kenya, Korea, Mexico, New Zealand, Nigeria, Rwanda, Tanzania, Thailand, Uganda, the UAE, and the United States.





REVENUE & EXPENSES


As a percentage of total income, tuition and fees represented 38%. Keeping this percentage down has offered our students a more affordable education. Temporarily restricted contributions and investment income represented the next largest segments of total income at 23% each.


The Seminary spends only 20% of its budget on institutional support, exhibiting a high level of efficiency and commitment to academic and student programs (69%).






ENDOWMENT GROWTH
